Dear Friends and Supporters,

The 2015-16 school year has been one of the most tumultuous in modern history. We have witnessed the rise of strikingly different political ideologies which have polarized American society over issues of race, immigration, religion and the distribution of wealth. We have been devastated by the effects of mass shootings, and we have seen social media shine a light on the difficult relationship between law enforcement and communities exactly like the ones our students live and learn in.

We are faced with a sobering question: ***Am I a part of the problem or a part of the solution?*** All of us at Super Stars Literacy have committed ourselves to being part of the solution.



Reading is a critical point of impact that can be leveraged into a life-changing experience, one that empowers an individual to transcend their circumstances and thus transform communities. Imagine experiencing kindergarten, first and second grade without this skill, feeling anxious and unsure. Then imagine 10 or 20 years in the future, trying to navigate adulthood without being able to read proficiently. Consider the compounding impact on earning a living, managing your health, protecting your rights, and voting.

We have the collective power to change that narrative for the more than 1000 students touched by Super Stars Literacy each year. By teaching



our children how to read, we are actively empowering them for success today and for the rest of their lives. As you read through our annual report, I ask you to really consider the stories of our children, their everyday circumstances and what they are experiencing in our program. Think about your personal role and consider how you can increase your involvement by volunteering with our students, contributing your skills to our leadership, and by giving financially to this important work.

Dream with us, as we build the foundation which will ultimately support many more students on their journey of learning to read. While the 2015-16 school year was tumultuous, it also allowed us to celebrate important “firsts” in our history: our first African-American President and our first woman chosen as a major party presidential candidate. It also delivered 1034 students acquiring critical reading skills. Together, let’s continue to build upon that momentum.

ABOUT SUPER STARS LITERACY

Because a child who cannot read proficiently by 3rd grade is at least four times as likely to later drop out of school, Super Stars Literacy (SSL) partners with schools in under-resourced communities to provide extended learning intervention to at-risk K-2nd grade students. Our goal is for students to develop the literacy and social-emotional skills that are the foundation for academic success. The school site based program includes daily after-school programming led by trained AmeriCorps members, in-school reading intervention coordinated with students’ school-day teachers, and family engagement activities which help parents support their children’s reading development and facilitate school-family connections.

Originally created as a service project of the Junior League of Oakland-East Bay, Inc., the Super Stars Literacy program was launched at a single Oakland school in 2002. SSL received its own nonprofit status in 2008 and has expanded to now serve more than 1000 students per year.

28 AmeriCorps members

provided daily in-school and after-school instruction.



357 volunteers

worked with students in the after-school program or served on committees.



9 school sites

partnered with SSL to refer and support their struggling students.



1034 students

participated in the SSL program, receiving an average of 80 hours of in-school intervention and 430 hours of after-school programming.



1 new pilot program

provided intensive year-end literacy support through the Saturday Academy model.



28 family events

provided opportunities for parents to learn about reading resources and work with their child on literacy activities.

OUR SUPER STARS

Helen Brown, 1st Grade AmeriCorps Group Leader at Garfield Elementary, describes the changes she has seen in her students this year.

KAYLA When I first started working with Kayla, she could not even read a three-letter word. She had no confidence, would often shut down, and was afraid to try new things, because she was convinced she would fail. To help her feel safe, we worked out a self-monitoring system where if she felt overwhelmed, she could regroup by holding a stuffed animal for a few minutes. Over time, she improved by six reading levels and is now thriving. Her self-confidence has blossomed and she recently read a whole book to me. Considering how she previously struggled with the most basic words, this shows how important Super Stars Literacy is for students like Kayla.

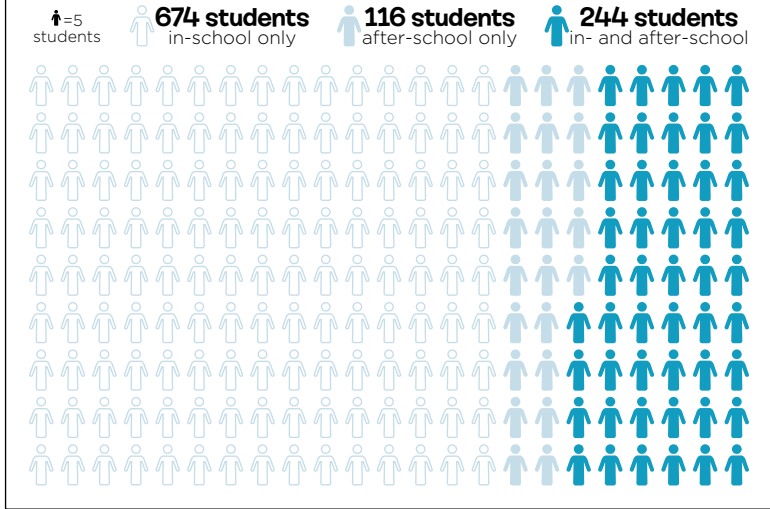
HATHAI Because of the trauma of spending her early years in a refugee camp, Hathai had trust issues and would act out through defiance and disruptions that prevented her and her classmates from learning. Initially she refused to talk to me, but once she got used to seeing me every day in the after-school program as well as in her daytime classroom, Hathai started to lower her guard, constantly asking me, “Why do you come to my class? Will you be there tomorrow? Will you be there next week?” After she realized she could depend on me, we started to form a trusting bond. I discovered that if I just stayed in close proximity to her she would feel secure enough that she could stay calm and focused. A turning point came when Hathai, who normally avoids physical contact, spontaneously hugged

me goodbye. Now she always sits near me, tells me about her day, and gives me a hug when she leaves. Even though she only just learned English in the past couple of years, she is already reading above grade level!

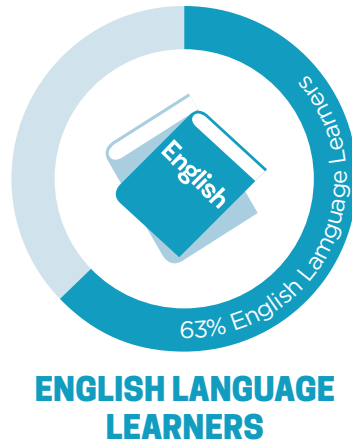
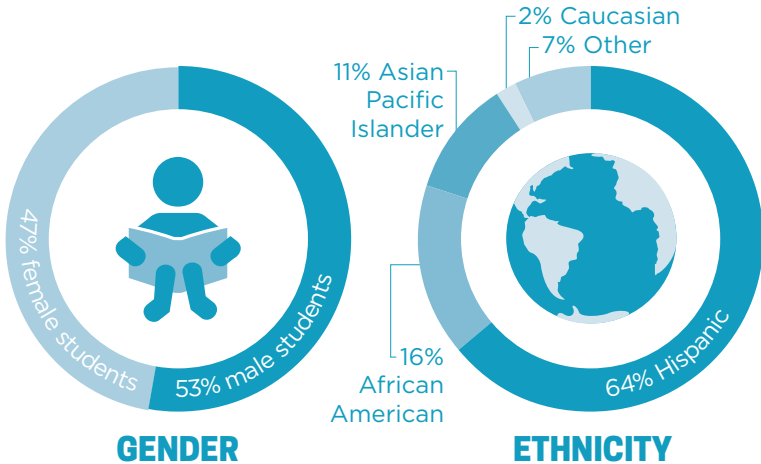
LEVELS OF INTERVENTION



SATURDAY ACADEMY
A NEW SSL PROGRAM

In May 2016, SSL piloted a “Saturday Academy” program at Oakland’s Monarch Academy, in which 40 K-3rd grade students participated in a condensed version of the Super Stars Literacy program spanning four Saturdays. The Saturday Academy was designed to give struggling students a year-end boost in their literacy skills and help them catch up before they enter a new grade in the fall. The program was a success, with students showing improvement in DIBELS and Developmental Reading Assessment scores. We are exploring opportunities to bring this “lower-dosage” program model to more students and schools in the coming years.

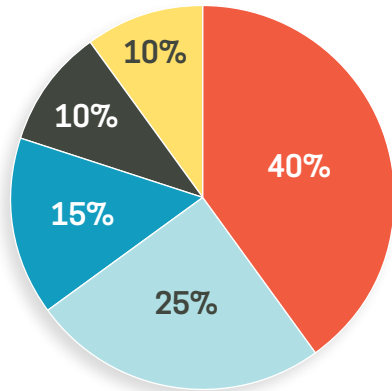

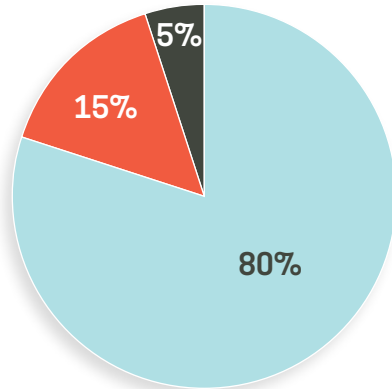
